The Gospel of Luke

The Transfiguration of Jesus Christ

Luke 9:28-36

1. A Glorious Revelation (vs.28-29)

It was normal for Jesus to go away from the crowds in order to pray (Luke 5:16; 11:1), and occasionally He brought His disciples along with Him (cf. Luke 22:39-41). While He was praying, Jesus was gloriously transfigured to such a degree that even His clothing was changed (cf. Matt 17:2; Mark 9:3).

2. A Heavenly Conversation (vs.30-31)

A. The Significance of those Present: Moses and Elijah

Moses' presence is likely because He is the chief representative of God's past work in both revelation and redemption (cf. Luke 24:44). Elijah is there because he has a uniquely significant place in the ministry of the Messiah (cf. Mark 9:11-13).

B. The Significance of Their Conversation

While Jesus had only recently informed the disciples that He must be rejected, suffer, and die (cf. Luke 9:22), Moses and Elijah speak to Jesus with certainty that this was going to happen.

3. An Earthly Reaction (vs.32-33)

The disciples had a bad habit of falling asleep at the wrong time (cf. Matt 26:43), and they now awoke to a very amazing reunion. Peter was overwhelmed with this experience and was unable to find the right thing to say (cf. Mark 9:6),

4. A Divine Pronouncement (vs.34-35)

The sudden appearance of a cloud which engulfed the disciples intensified the fear that they had experienced from when they first awoke (Mark 9:6) and that culminated when God spoke from the cloud (Matt 17:6). Instead of speaking to Jesus, God speaks directly to the disciples concerning Jesus (cf. Luke 3:21-22).

5. The Fulfillment of a Promise (cf. v.27)

When God was glorified through the many merciful miracles performed by Jesus and the disciples, the kingdom of God was said to be near them (cf. Luke 10:8-9). This experience of the three disciples uniquely fulfilled Jesus' promise that some of His disciples would see the kingdom of God before they died.

6. An Intentional Silence (v.36)

Jesus commanded that the disciples keep silent about this experience until after His resurrection (Matt 17:9; Mark 9:9; cf. Luke 9:19).
